

# Important safety instructions

Your projector is designed and tested to meet the latest standards for safety of information technology equipment. However, to ensure safe use of this product, it is important that you follow the instructions mentioned in this manual and marked on the product.

#### Safety Instructions

 Please read this manual before you operate your projector. Save it for future reference.



 Do not look straight at the projector lens during operation.
 The intense light beam may damage your eyes.



Refer servicing to qualified service personnel.



 Always open the lens shutter or remove the lens cap when the projector lamp is on.



5. In some countries, the line voltage is NOT stable. This projector is designed to operate safely within a mains voltage between 100 to 240 volts AC, but could fail if power cuts or surges of ±10 volts occur. In areas where the mains voltage may fluctuate or cut out, it is recommended that you connect your projector through a power stabilizer, surge protector or uninterruptible power supply (UPS).



 Do not block the projection lens with any objects when the projector is under operation as this could cause the objects to become heated and deformed or even cause a fire. To temporarily turn off the lamp, press BLANK on the projector or remote control.



#### Safety Instructions (Continued)

 The lamp becomes extremely hot during operation. Allow the projector to cool for approximately 45 minutes prior to removing the lamp assembly for replacement.



 Do not operate lamps beyond the rated lamp life. Excessive operation of lamps beyond the rated life could cause them to break on rare occasions.



 N ever replace the lamp assembly or any electronic components unless the projector is unplugged.



 Do not place this product on an unstable cart, stand, or table. The product may fall, sustaining serious damage.



11. Do not attempt to disassemble this projector. There are dangerous high voltages inside which may cause death if you should come into contact with live parts. The only user serviceable part is the lamp which has its own removable cover. Under no circumstances should you ever undo or remove any other covers. Refer servicing only to suitably qualified professional service personnel.




 W hen the projector is under operation, you may sense some heated air and odor from its ventilation grill. It is a normal phenomenon and not a product defect.

#### Safety Instructions (Continued)

- Do not place this projector in any of the following environments.
  - Space that is poorly ventilated or confined. Allow at least 50 cm clearance from walls and free flow of air around the projector.
  - Locations where temperatures may become excessively high, such as the inside of a car with all windows rolled up.
  - Locations where excessive humidity, dust, or cigarette smoke may contaminate optical components, shortening the projector's life span and darkening the image.



- Locations near fire alarms
- Locations with an ambient temperature above 40°C / 104°F
- Locations where the altitudes are higher than 3000 m (10000 feet).




- 14. Do not block the ventilation holes.
  - Do not place this projector on a blanket, bedding or any other soft surface.
  - Do not cover this projector with a cloth or any other item.
  - Do not place inflammables near the projector.



If the ventilation holes are seriously obstructed, overheating inside the projector may result in a fire.

- 15. Always place the projector on a level, horizontal surface during operation.
  - Do not use if tilted at an angle of more than 10 degrees left to right, nor at angle of more than 15 degrees front to back.
     Using the projector when it is not fully horizontal may cause a malfunction of, or damage to, the lamp.



 Do not stand the projector on end vertically. Doing so may cause the projector to fall over, causing injury or resulting in damage to the projector.



### Safety Instructions (Continued)

 Do not step on the projector or place any objects upon it. Besides probable physical damage to the projector, doing so may result in accidents and possible injury.



18. Do not place liquids near or on the projector. Liquids spilled into the projector may cause it to fail. If the projector does become wet, disconnect it from the power supply's wall socket and call BenQ to have the projector serviced.



 This product is capable of displaying inverted images for ceiling mount installation.



Use only BenQ's Ceiling Mount Kit for mounting the projector and ensure it is securely installed.





# Ceiling mounting the projector

We want you to have a pleasant experience using your BenQ projector, so we need to bring this safety matter to your attention to prevent possible damage to person and property.

If you intend to mount your projector on the ceiling, we strongly recommend that you use a proper fitting BenQ projector ceiling mount kit and that you ensure it is securely and safely installed.

If you use a non-BenQ brand projector ceiling mount kit, there is a safety risk that the projector may fall from the ceiling due to an improper attachment through the use of the wrong gauge or length screws. You can purchase a BenQ projector ceiling mount kit from the place you purchased your BenQ projector. BenQ recommends that you also purchase a separate Kensington lock compatible security cable and attach it securely to both the Kensington lock slot on the projector and the base of the ceiling mount bracket. This will perform the secondary role of restraining the projector should its attachment to the mounting bracket become loose.

# **Projector features**

#### Full HD compatible

The projector is compatible with Standard Definition TV (SDTV) 480i, 576i, Enhanced Definition television (EDTV) 480p, 576p and High Definition TV (HDTV) 720p, 1080i/p 60Hz formats, with the 1080p format providing a true 1:1 image reproduction.

#### High picture quality

The projector provides excellent picture quality due to its high resolution, excellent home theater brightness, high contrast ratio, vivid color and rich gray-scale reproduction.

#### · High brightness

The projector features super high brightness to achieve excellent picture quality in ambient light conditions, outperforming ordinary projectors.

### · Vivid color reproduction

The projector features a 6-segment color wheel to produce realistic color depth and range unattainable with lesser segment color wheels.

#### · Rich gray-scale

W hen viewed in a darkened environment, the automatic gamma control provides excellent gray-scale display which reveals details in shadows and in night or darkened scenes.

#### 2D Keystone

The projector offers horizontal (side to side) keystone correction, enabling a wider projector installation area. When the projector is placed off center, the 2D keystone correction feature gives you a wider projector installation flexibility by correcting the trapezoid effect using horizontal and vertical adjustments.

#### Dual OSD

Two types of O SD menus are designed for different usage customs: the Basic O SD is intuitive and consumerlike, while the Advanced O SD offers traditional usability.

#### W ide variety of inputs and video formats

The projector supports a wide variety of inputs for connection to your video and PC equipment, including component video, S-Video, and composite video, as well as dual HDMI, PC, and an output trigger for connection to automated screen and environment lighting systems.

#### ISF certified calibration control

To reach a higher standard of performance, the projector incorporates ISF NIGHT and ISF DAY mode settings in its O SD menus, which requires professional calibration service from authorized ISF installers.

#### 3D function

To enjoy the 3D movies, videos, and sporting events in a more realistic way by presenting the depth of the images through HDMI.

Built-in speaker(s) providing mixed mono audio when an audio input is connected.










### **Projector**



#### 1. FOCUS/ZOOM Ring

Used to adjust the projected image appearance. See "Fine-tuning the image size and clarity" on page 33 for details.

2. LENS SHIFT adjuster

Used to adjust the projector len up or down. See "Shifting the projection lens" on page 20 for details.

3. POW ER indicator light

Lights up or flashes when the projector is under operation. See "Indicators" on page 67 for details.

4. SOURCE

D isplays the source selection bar. See "Switching input signal" on page 44 for details.

5. ◀ Left/

Manually corrects distorted image resulting from an angled projection.

() POW ER

Toggles the projector between standby mode and on.

7. BACK

Goes back to previous OSD menu, exits and 15. saves menu settings.

8. TEMPerature indicator light

Lights up red if the projector's temperature becomes too high. See "Indicators" on page 67 for details.

 Manually corrects distorted images
 resulting from an angled projection.

10. LAMP indicator light

12. ► Right/

Manually corrects distorted image resulting from an angled projection.

When the On-Screen Display (OSD) menu is activated, the #5, #9, #12, and #15 keys are used as directional arrows to select the desired menu items and to make adjustments. See "Using the Advanced OSD menu" on page 40 for details.

13. OK/MODE



### Remote control



1. **II** ON, **II** OFF

Toggles the projector between on and off mode.

3D, INVERT

Launches the 3D menu and toggles the invert function between on and off.

 Arrow keys (▲ Up/▼ Down/◀ Left/ ► Right)

W hen the On-Screen Display (OSD) menu is activated, these keys are used as directional arrows to select the desired menu items and to make adjustments. W hen the OSD menu is off and you are under the MHL connection mode, these arrows keys are available for controlling your smart device.

#### 4. OK

Confirms the selected O SD menu item. When the O SD menu is off and you are under the MHL connection mode, use the key to confirm the selection on the O SD of your smart device.

5. BACK

Goes back to previous OSD menu, exits and saves menu settings.

W hen the O SD menu is off and you are under the MHL connection mode, use the key to return or exit the O SD menu of your smart device.

- 6. **■**(∅, **■**() , **■**())
  - Mute: Toggles projector audio between on and off.
  - Volume Down: Decreases the projector volume.
  - Volume Up: Increases the projector volume.
- MHL Control buttons

W hen you are under the MHL connection mode and the OSD is off, these buttons are available for controlling your smart device: arrow keys, OK, BACK, and MHL control buttons.

#### 8. KEYSTONE

Launches the 2D Keystone window. Use the Arrow keys to manually correct distorted images resulting from an angled projection.

Picture quality adjustment keys
 These function keys perform the same tasks as specified in the OSD menu.

#### 10. LIGHT

The LED backlight lights up and stays on for approximately 30 seconds when pressing any key on the remote control. Pressing any other keys within the 10 second again turns the LED backlight off.

#### **11. AUTO**

Automatically determines the best picture timings for the displayed image.

#### 12. ECO BLANK

Used to blank the screen picture.

#### 13. MENU

- Accesses the On-Screen Display (OSD) menu.
- Goes back to previous O SD menu, exits and saves menu settings.

#### 14. SOURCE

Displays the source selection bar.

#### 15. MODE

Selects an available picture mode.

#### 16. FINETUNE



### Remote control effective range


Infra-Red (IR) remote control sensor is located on the front and the top of the projector. The remote control must be held at an angle within 30 degrees perpendicular to the projector's IR remote control sensor to function correctly. The distance between the remote control and the sensor should not exceed 8 meters (~ 26 feet).

Make sure that there are no obstacles between the remote control and the IR sensor on the projector that might obstruct the infra-red beam.




### Replacing the remote control battery


 Remove the battery compartment cover by sliding the cover in the direction of the arrow.



2. Insert the supplied batteries taking note of the polarity (+/-) as shown here.



3. Replace the cover.





- Avoid excessive heat and humidity.
- There may be battery damage if the battery is incorrectly replaced.
- · Replace only with the sameor equivalent type recommended by the battery manufacturer.
- Dispose of the used battery according to the battery manufacturer's instructions.
- · Never throw a battery into a fire. There may be danger of an explosion.
- If the battery is dead or if you will not beusing the remote control for a long time, remove
  the battery to prevent damage to the remote control from possible battery leakage.

# Positioning your projector

### Choosing a location

Before choosing an installation location for your projector, take the following factors into consideration:


- · Size and position of your screen
- Electrical outlet location
- Location and distance between the projector and the rest of your equipment
   You can install your projector in the following ways.

#### 1. Front Table

Select this location with the projector placed near the floor in front of the screen.

This is the most common way to position the projector for quick setup and portability.

Turn on the projector and make the following settings:



#### 2. Rear Table

Select this location with the projector placed near the floor behind the screen.

Turn on the projector and make the following settings:

MENU > Settings or System Setup : Basic > Projector Position > Rear




#### 3. Front Ceiling

Select this location with the projector suspended from the ceiling in front of the screen.

Turn on the projector and make the following settings:

MENU > Settings or System Setup : Basic > Projector Position > Front Ceiling



### 4. Rear Ceiling

Select this location with the projector suspended from the ceiling behind the screen.

Turn on the projector and make the following settings:

MENU > Settings or System Setup : Basic > Projector Position > Rear Ceiling

A special rear projection screen and the BenQ Projector Ceiling Mount Kit are required.











# O btaining a preferred projected image size

The projected image size is determined by the distance from the projector lens to the screen, the zoom setting, and the video format.

### **Projection dimensions**



There is 5% tolerance among these numbers due to optical component variations. BenQ recommends that if you intend to permanently install the projector, you should physically test the projection size and distance using the actual projector before you permanently install it, so as to make allowance for this projector's optical characteristics. This will help you determine the exact mounting position so that it best suits your installation location.

## Shifting the projection lens

The lens shift control provides flexibility for installing your projector. It allows the projector to be positioned off the center of the screen.

The lens shift is expressed as a percentage of the projected image half height. It is measured as an offset from the projected image's vertical center. You can shift the projection lens within the allowable range depending on your desired image position.




F Lens shift adjustment will not result in a degraded picture quality. In the unlikely event that the image distortion is produced, see "Correcting keystone" on page 33 for details.

### Connection

When connecting a signal source to the projector, be sure to:

- 1. Turn all equipment off before making any connections.
- 2. Use the correct signal cables for each source.
- Ensure the cables are firmly inserted.
- In the connections shown below, some cables may not beincluded with the projector (see "Shipping contents" on page 9). They are commercially available from electronics stores.
  - The connection illustrations below are for reference only. The rear connecting jacks available on the projector vary with each projector model.



### **HDMI** connection

HDMI (High-Definition Multimedia Interface) supports uncompressed video data transmission between compatible devices like DTV tuners, DVD players, Blu-ray players and displays over a single cable. You should use an HDMI cable when making a connection between the projector and HDMI devices.




### Smart devices connection

The projector can project the content directly from a MHL compatible smart device. Using an HDMI to Micro USB cable or an HDMI to Micro USB adaptor, you can connect your smart devices to the projector and then enjoy your content on the big screen.

Some smart devices may not be compatible to the cable that you use. Please consult the manufacturer of your smart device for detailed information.


### Using an HDMI to Micro USB cable

- Connect one end of the HDMI to Micro USB cable to the HDMI input connector on the projector.
- Connect the other end of the HDMI to Micro USB cable to the Micro USB output socket on your smart device.
- Switch to the HDMI/MHL input source. To switch input signal, see "Switching input signal" on page 44 for details.




### Using an HDMI to Micro USB adaptor and an HDMI cable

- 1. Connect one end of the HDMI cable to the HDMI input connector on the projector.
- 2. Connect the other end of the HDMI cable to the HDMI input socket on the adaptor.
- Connect the other end of the adaptor to the Micro USB output socket on your smart device.
- Switch to the HDMI/MHL input source. To switch input signal, see "Switching input signal" on page 44 for details.





- Many notebooks do not turn on their externalvideo ports when connected to a projector. Usually a key combo like FN + F3 or CRT/LCD key turns the external display on/off. Locate a function key labeled CRT/LCD or a function key with a monitor symbol on the notebook. Press FN and the labeled function key simultaneously. Refer to your notebook's documentation to find your notebook's key combination.

### Connecting video source devices

You need only connect the projector to a video source device using just one of the connecting methods, however each provides a different level of video quality. The method you choose will most likely depend upon the availability of matching terminals on both the projector and the video source device as described below:

### Connecting audio

The projector has one built-in mono speaker which are designed to provide basic audio functionality accompanying data presentations for business purposes only. They are not designed for, nor intended for stereo audio reproduction use as might be expected in home theater or home cinema applications. Any stereo audio input (if provided), is mixed into a common mono audio output through the projector speaker.

The built-in speaker will be muted when the AUDIO OUT jack is connected.

- The projector is only capable of playing mixed mono audio, even if a stereo audio input is connected. See "Connecting audio" on page 28 for details.
  - If the selected video image is not displayed afer the projector is turned on and the correct video source has been selected, check that the video source device is turned on and operating correctly. Also check that the signal cables have been connected correctly.

### Playing sound through the projector

You can make use of the projector (mixed mono) speaker in your presentations, and also connect separate amplified speakers to the AUDIO OUT socket of the projector.

If you have a separate sound system, you will most likely want to connect the audio output of your Video source device to that sound system, instead of to the mono audio projector.

Once connected, the audio can be controlled by the projector On-Screen Display (OSD) menus.

The table below describes the connection methods for different devices, and where the sound is from.



The selected input signal determines which sound will be played by the projector speaker, and which sound will be output from the projector when AUDIO OUT is connected. If you select the COMPUTER/PC signal, the projector can play the sound received from AUDIO IN mini jack. If you select the COMPONENT/VIDEO signal, the projector can play the sound received from AUDIO (L/R).

# Operation

### Starting up the projector

 Plug the power cord into the projector and into a wall socket. Turn on the wall socket switch (where fitted). Check that the POW ER indicator light on the projector lights orange after power has been applied.





 Press POW ER on the projector or remote control to start the projector and a start up tone sounds. The POW ER indicator light flashes green and stays green when the projector is on.

The fans starts operating, and a start-up image display on the screen while it warms up. The projector does not respond to further commands whiles it is warm up. (If necessary) Rotate the focus ring to adjust the image clearness.

To turn off the ring tone, see "Power On/Off Ring Tone" on page 59 for details.

- If the projector is still hot from previous activity, it will run the cooling fan for approximately 90 seconds before energizing the lamp.
  - If this is the first time you turn on the projector, the setup wizard appears to guide you through setting up the projector. If you have already done this, skip this step and move on to step 5.
    - Use the arrow keys (▲/▼/◄/►) on the projector or remote control to move through the menu items.
    - Use O K to confirm the selected menu item.
- The Setup W izard screenshots below are for reference only and may differ from the actual design.

Now you've completed the initial setup.



- If you are prompted for a password, press the arrow keys to enter a six digit password. See "Utilizing the password function" on page 41 for details.
- 5. Switch all of the connected equipment on.
- The projector will start to search for input signals. The current input signal being scanned displays in the upper left corner of the screen. If the projector doesn't detect a valid signal, the message 'No Signal' will continue displaying until an input signal is found.

You can also press SOURCE on the projector or remote control to select your desired input signal. See "Switching input signal" on page 44 for details.

If the frequency/resolution of the input signal exceeds the projector's operating range, you will see the message 'Out of Range' displayed on a blank screen. Please change to an input signal which is compatible with the projector's resolution or set the input signal to a lower setting. See "Timing chart" on page 71 for details.


### Adjusting the projected image

### Adjusting the projection angle

The projector is equipped with 1 quick-release adjuster foot and 2 rear adjuster foot. These adjusters change the image height and projection angle. To adjust the projector:

- Press the quick-release button and lift the front of the projector. Once the image is positioned where you want it, release the quick-release button to lock the foot in position.
- Screw the rear adjuster foot to fine tune the horizontal angle.

To retract the foot, hold up the projector while pressing the quick-release button, then slowly lower the projector. Screw the rear adjuster foot in a reverse direction.



If the projector is not placed on a flat surface or the screen and the projector are not perpendicular to each other, the projected image becomes trapezoidal. To correct this situation, see "Correcting keystone" on page 33 for details.



- Do not look into the lens while the lamp is on. The strong light from the lamp may cause damage to your eyes.
- Be careful when you press the adjuster button asit is close to the exhaust vent where hot air comes from.

### Auto-adjusting the image

In some cases, you may need to optimize the picture quality. To do this, press AUTO on the projector or remote control. Within 3 seconds, the built-in Intelligent Auto Adjustment function will re-adjust the values of Frequency and Clock to provide the best picture quality.

The current source information will be displayed in the upper left corner of the screen for 3 seconds.



- The screen will be blank while AUTO is functioning.
- This function is only available whenPC signal (analog RGB) is selected.

### Fine-tuning the image size and clarity

 Adjust the projected image to the size that you need using the ZOOM ring.





Then sharpen the image by rotating the FOCUS ring.



### Correcting keystone


Keystoning refers to the situation where the projected image is noticeably wider at either the top or bottom. It occurs when the projector is not perpendicular to the screen.

You may correct this in ONE of these ways.

- Using the remote control Press KEYSTONE to display, the 2D Keystone window.
- Using the projector

Press ▲/w, ▼/▲, ◄/ or ▶/ to display the 2D Keystone window.





- Press ◆/ Press ►/ .
- To correct keystoning at the top of the image, use ▼/▲.
- To correct keystoning at the bottom of the image, use .
- To correct keystoning at the right side of the image, use ◀/ ■.
- To correct keystoning at the left side of the image, use ▶/ ■.

When done, press BACK to save your changes and exit.



## Securing the projector

#### Using a security cable lock

The projector has to be installed in a safe place to prevent theft. Otherwise, purchase a lock, such as a Kensington lock, to secure the projector. You can locate a Kensington lock slot on the left side of the projector. See "Kensington anti-theft lock slot" on page 10 for details.

A Kensington security cable lock is usually a combination of key(s) and a lock. Refer to the lock's documentation for finding out how to use it.

#### Utilizing the password function

For security purposes and to help prevent unauthorized use, the projector includes an option for setting up password security. The password can be set through the On-Screen Display (OSD) menu. For details of the OSD menu operation, please refer to "Using the Advanced OSD menu" on page 40.

You will be inconvenienced if you activate the power-on lock functionality and subsequently for get the password. Print out this manual (if necessary) and write the password you used in this manual, and keep the manual in a safe place for later recall.

#### Setting a password

- Tonce a password has been set, the projector cannot be used unless the correct password is entered every time the projector is started.
  - Open the OSD menu and go to the System Setup: Advanced > Password menu. Press OK. The Password page displays.

#### **Maintenance**

#### Care of the projector

Your projector needs little maintenance. The only thing you need to do on a regular basis is to keep the lens clean.


N ever remove any parts of the projector except the lamp. Contact your dealer if other parts need replacing.

## Cleaning the lens

Clean the lens whenever you notice dirt or dust on the surface.

Before cleaning any part of the projector, turn it off using the proper shutdown procedure (see "Shutting down the projector" on page 57), unplug the power cable, and let it cool down completely.

- Use a canister of compressed air to remove dust.
- If there is dirt or smears, use lens-cleaning paper or moisten a soft cloth with lens cleaner and gently wipe the lens surface.
- N ever use any type of abrasive pad, alkalineacid cleaner, scouring powder, or volatile solvent, such as alcohol, benzene, thinner or insecticide. Using such materials or maintaining prolonged contact with rubber or vinyl materials may result in damage to the projector surface and cabinet material.



## Cleaning the projector case

Before you clean the case, turn the projector off using the proper shutdown procedure as described in "Shutting down the projector" on page 57 and unplug the power cord and let it cool down completely.

- To remove dirt or dust, wipe the case with a soft, lint-free cloth.
- To remove stubborn dirt or stains, moistena soft cloth with water and a neutral pH detergent. Then wipe the case.



Never use wax, alcohol, benzene, thinner or other chemical detergents. These can damage the case.

## Storing the projector

To store the projector for an extended time.

- Make sure the temperature and humidity of the stoage area are within the recommended range for the projector. Please refer to "Specifications" on page 69 or consult your dealer about the range.
- Retract the adjuster feet.
- · Remove the battery from the remote control.
- Pack the projector in its original packing or equivalent.

#### Transporting the projector

It is recommended that you ship the projector with its original packing or equivalent.

#### Lamp information

## Getting to know the lamp hour

W hen the projector is in operation, the duration (in hours) of lamp usage is automatically calculated by the built-in timer.

To obtain the lamp hour information:

- Press MEN U and then use the arrow keys (▲/▼/◄/►) to go to Information or Settings > Information.
- The Equivalent Lamp Hour information displays.
- 3. Press BACK to exit.

## **Extending lamp life**

The projection lamp is a consumable item. To keep the lamp life as long as possible, you can do the following settings via the Advanced OSD menu.

#### **Setting Lamp Power**

Setting the projector in Economic or Smart Eco mode also extends the lamp life.

Lamp mode	Description

Using Economic mode reduces system noise and power consumption by 30%. Using SmartEco mode reduces system noise and lamp power consumption by up to 70%. If the Economic or SmartEco mode is selected, the light output will be reduced and result in darker projected pictures.

#### **Setting Auto Power Off**



## Replacing the lamp




- If lamp replacement is performed while theprojector is suspended upside-down from the ceiling, make sure that no one is underneath the lamp socket to avoid any possible injury or damage to the human eyes caused by fractured lamp.
- To reduce the risk of electrical shock, alwaysturn the projector off and disconnect the power cord before changing the lamp.
- To reduce the risk of severe burns, allow the projector to cool for at least 45 minutes before replacing the lamp.
- To reduce the risk of injuries to fingers and damageto internal components, use caution when removing lamp glass that has shattered into sharp pieces.
- To reduce the risk of injuries to fingers and/or compounds image quality by touching the lens, do not touch the empty lamp compartment when the lamp is removed.
- This lamp contains mercury. Consult your local hazardous waste regulations to dispose of this lamp in a proper manner.
- To assure optimal performance from the projector, it is recommended that you purchase a BenQ projector lamp for lamp replacement.
- Ensure good ventilation when handling broken lamps. We recommend that you use respirators, safety glasses, goggles or face shield and wear protective clothing such as gloves.
- Turn the power off and disconnect the projector from the wall socket. If the lamp is hot, avoid burns by waiting for approximately 45 minutes until the lamp has cooled.
- Loosen the captive screw from the front.
- Remove the lamp compartment cover as shown.

- Do not turn the power on with the lamp cover removed.
  - Do not insert your fingers between the lamp and the projector. The sharp edges inside the projector may cause injuries.



Lift the handle so that it stands up. Use the handle to slowly pull the lamp out of the projector.









#### **Ceiling Mount Installation**
